Children at Risk

Currently, 2.4 million students in America are diagnosed with a learning disability such as ADD, ADHD, Dyslexia, and Autism and receive special education services in our schools. Genetics and poor prenatal care are two of the main causes of learning disabilities. The symptoms of a learning disability may increase if a child is surrounded by certain circumstances such as child abuse and a lack of early childhood education.
